GEORGIA ARCHIVES LUNCH AND LEARN

Morrow, GA, May 24, 2016 – Join us for our June Lunch and Learn program on Friday June 10, 2016. Dustin Klein, archivist at the Southern Museum of Civil War and Locomotive History in Kennesaw, will speak.

In addition to telling the facility's history, Klein will also talk about current exhibits, collections, and programs, including discussion of the Great Locomotive Chase. The Museum is home to locomotive, the General, made famous during the Great Locomotive Chase of 1862, an impressive Civil War collection, and the Glover Machine Works, a restored early 20th century belt-driven locomotive assembly line. The Jolley Education Center offers numerous hands-on and interactive exhibits, and the Cobb Energy Gallery features traveling exhibits from the Smithsonian Institution Traveling Exhibition Service (SITES), as well as other sources.

Dustin Klein received his bachelor's degree in history from the University of Georgia in 2012. He worked as a graduate research assistant on the West Georgia Textile Heritage Trail at the Center for Public History at the University of West Georgia, where he is currently working on his master's degree in history, with a concentration in public history and the American South.

Lunch and Learn programs begin at noon and are free to the public. No registration is necessary.
